Direct speech is the exact words spoken by the person talking, written inside inverted commas (speech marks).

The exact words of the speaker are enclosed in inverted commas (speech marks).	In direct speech, the exact words of the speaker are quoted with no change to their content or order.	The correct punctuation is used before the inverted commas close.	There is often a reporting clause to explain who said the speech. Sometimes the reporting clause can be extended with an adverb, subordinate clause or prepositional phrase to explain more about how, where or when the speech was said. The reporting clause can appear before or after the spoken words themselves.

In reported speech, the words spoken by the person talking are not written inside inverted commas and can be changed.

Toad trouble avoided

The cancellation of cross-country races due to the coronavirus is great news for toads. A toad protection group in North Yorkshire says that hundreds of toads have been trampled in previous years. Local races, hosted by Wharfedale Harriers, take place close to a pond where the toads mate.

Castle couriers

Warwick Castle has been donating its food to the local community. Since the attraction closed to the public last week, the team have given all their usual food deliveries to Warwick District Foodbank, to pass on to those who need it most.

HAMPSHIRE



Community help

A hospice that cares for the sick and dying has had the wheels from one of its vans stolen. Rowans Hospice in Waterlooville shared the pic online. The post was shared over 3,000 times and lots of people offered help. A local couple, Mellony and Richard Clegg, provided a new set of wheels to get the van back on the road. It's the perfect reminder that when someone does something bad, there are many more people ready to do good.

POOLE

Crushing loss

The driver of a council van made a big mistake when he parked too close to Poole Bridge. The bridge can open and close to let tall boats pass through, but is currently undergoing maintenance.
