

Volcanoes can make sunsets appear more beautiful.	True	For many years after the largest volcanic eruption in human history (Mount Tambora in 1815), volcanic ash had an impact on the clouds and sunsets which can be seen in paintings created during the period.	
Lava moves too fast for you to be able to run away from it.	False	Even on a steep slope, lava does not flow any faster than 30kmph. This means that a human could comfortably outpace a lava over a short distance. On gentler slopes, lava would travel even more slowly.
